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ased on data released by the Ministry of Agriculture-Jahad, major agricultural products, including farming, horticultural, livestock, and fishery products, amounted to 110.1 million tons in 2021/22. Based on preliminary data, the value added of the agriculture, forestry, and fishing sector indicated a growth rate of -2.6 percent in 2021/22 (at constant 2016/17 prices).

According to the National Drought Warning and Monitoring Center affiliated to Iran Meteorological Organization, total precipitation amounted to 241.1 billion cubic meters in the farming year 2020/21¹, with an average height of 146.3 millimeters. This showed a decrease of 49.8 percent compared with the previous farming year (2019/20) and a fall of 37.6 percent compared with the long-term average (52 years).

3.1. Farming and Horticultural Products

Based on data released by the Ministry of Agriculture-Jahad, about 92.9 million tons of farming and horticultural products were harvested in 2021/22¹, showing a decrease of 20.0 percent compared with the year before. Of total farming and horticultural products, 70.5 million tons (75.9 percent) were farming products, showing a decrease of 23.2 percent compared with the year before. Horticultural products amounted to 22.4 million tons, indicating a fall of 8.0 percent compared with 2020/21.

Grain production (wheat, barley, rice husks, and corn) decreased by almost 24.9 percent

to 17.3 million tons in 2021/22. Moreover, the production of barley and rice husks decreased by 36.0 percent and 33.5 percent, respectively, compared with the year before.

In 2021/22, total production of agroindustrial crops² decreased by 7.2 percent to 13.2 million tons. The production of sugar cane and sugar beet, with shares of respectively 45.0 percent and 49.5 percent in the production of agro-industrial crops, totaled respectively 5.9 million tons and 6.5 million tons. The production of sugar beet experienced the highest rise among agro-industrial crops by 16.3 percent.

3.2. Livestock and Fishery Products

According to the Ministry of Agriculture-Jahad, livestock products, including red meat, milk, poultry, eggs, and honey, amounted to 15.9 million tons in 2021/22, showing a fall of 0.4 percent compared with the year before.

In 2021/22, fishery products decreased by 0.8 percent to 1,258 thousand tons, with 53.4 percent of fishery products being related to the Persian Gulf, 2.4 percent to the Caspian Sea, and 44.2 percent to the aquaculture centers. The weight and value of fishery exports were 167 thousand tons and \$554 million, respectively, up by 19.5 and 4.8 percent, respectively, compared with the year before.

3.3. Guaranteed Purchase of Major Agricultural Products

Setting the guaranteed purchase price on agricultural products, aimed at encouraging farmers to produce basic agricultural goods,

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establishing a balanced production system, and maintaining the farmers' income level, has been an important government policy of recent years. In the farming year 2020/21, the guaranteed purchase price of farming products increased within a range of 35.0 to 107.1 percent compared with the year before. The guaranteed purchase price of wheat increased by 100.0 percent compared with 2020/21, with sugar beet (spring plantation) recording the highest rise in the guaranteed purchase price by 107.1 percent.

3.4. Subsidies

Subsidy paid on goods and services (subject to Budgetary Measure No. 520000) reached Rls. 16.3 trillion in 2021/22. Out of this amount, a sum of Rls. 1,069 billion was paid on agricultural goods, services, and

activities, constituting 6.6 percent of total subsidy payment out of the mentioned Budgetary Measure.

3.5. Government Investment

According to data released by the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Finance, government credits paid on the acquisition of non-financial assets for the development of "agriculture and natural resources" and "water resources" projects amounted to Rls. 199.6 trillion in 2021/22, which rose by 68.3 percent compared with the year before and constituted 47.4 percent of the approved figure (Rls. 420.9 trillion). The credits paid on the acquisition of non-financial assets of the "agriculture and natural resources" project reached Rls. 60.7 trillion, rising by 26.5 percent compared with 2020/21. The highest share of these credits by 52.1 percent was related to "improvement of agricultural lands" group. The credits paid on the development of water resources amounted to Rls. 138.9 trillion, indicating an increase of 96.6 percent compared with the year before. The "water supply" project accounted for the highest share of the credits allocated to the development of water resources by 56.4 percent.

3.6. Banking Facilities

Outstanding facilities (net) extended by banks and non-bank credit institutions to public and non-public sectors active in the field of agriculture grew by 39.6 percent to Rls. 2,085.7 trillion in March 2022. The share of the non-public agriculture sector in the outstanding facilities (net) was 99.9 percent. By March 2022, the outstanding facilities (net) extended by Bank Keshavarzi (Agriculture Bank of Iran) to the non-public agriculture sector rose by 34.4 percent to Rls. 1,307.7 trillion. The share of Bank Keshavarzi in the outstanding facilities (net) extended to the public and non-public agriculture sectors was 62.7 percent, showing a fall of 2.4 percentage points compared with March 2021. Furthermore, bank Keshavarzi paid Rls. 1,080.9 trillion through nonstatutory and statutory facilities, administered funds, and contracts in 2021/22, up by 51.9 percent compared with the year before. Out of credits paid by this bank, 86.5

percent (Rls. 935.1 trillion) were in the form of non-statutory resources, while 13.5 percent were in the form of statutory facilities, administered funds, and contracts. The composition of facilities extended by Bank Keshavarzi according to Islamic contracts indicates the high share of partnership contracts by 58.7 percent. A sum of Rls. 634.5 trillion was paid in the form of partnership contracts, indicating a rise of 53.9 percent. The composition of facilities extended by this bank by use indicates that "agricultural industries and services" activity (excluding the Gharz-al-hasaneh facilities), enjoying the highest share in total by 45.4 percent, increased by 70.6 percent to Rls. 490.5 trillion in 2021/22. Facilities extended by Bank Keshavarzi with a shortterm repayment period, rising by 56.7 percent compared with 2020/21, enjoyed the highest share of 77.2 percent compared with the medium- and long-term periods.

Figure 3.2. Outstanding Facilities (Net) Extended by Banks to Non-public Agriculture Sector

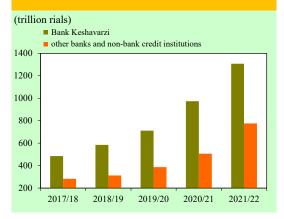


Figure 3.3. Facilities Extended by Bank Keshavarzi

3.7. Agricultural Insurance Fund

In the farming year 2020/21, about Rls. 33.0 trillion was paid to farmers by the Agricultural Insurance Fund as compensation, showing an increase of 110.8 percent compared with the previous farming year. As this Fund is a loss-making institution, a large proportion of its commitments on compensations are constantly being financed out of government subsidies. It is to be noted that the share of government subsidies in the total paid compensation amounted to 68.7 percent in the farming year 2020/21, while 31.3 percent was financed out of the farmers' premium payments. Due to the government's failure to fulfill its commitments in due

time, Bank Keshavarzi has continually been the body in charge of financing the deficit of the Agricultural Insurance Fund over the past years. According to the report released by the Agricultural Insurance Fund, in the farming year 2020/21, this Fund insured 4.3 million hectares of lands under the cultivation of 200 farming and horticultural products against losses from natural disasters. The cultivated land area covered by the insurance scheme indicates an increase of 32.3 percent compared with the year before. Meanwhile, a sum of Rls. 27.7 trillion was paid by the Fund as compensation on farming and horticultural products in 2021/22, experiencing an increase of 106.2 percent compared with 2020/21.

3.8. Performance of Rural, Women, and Agricultural Cooperatives and Unions

According to the Central Organization for Rural Cooperatives, the number of active rural, women, and agricultural cooperatives reached 6,710 in March 2022. These cooperatives covered 6.2 million rural dwellers, indicating an increase of 1.6 percent in terms of the number of cooperatives and a rise of 0.7 percent in terms of the members. By March 2022, the number of rural, women, and agricultural unions reached 503, up by 0.4 percent compared with March 2021. Meanwhile, the number of companies as member to these unions fell by 0.8 percent compared with March 2021, to 5,457 in March 2022. It is important to note that rural cooperatives purchased about 6.2 million tons of various agricultural products at agreed prices in March 2022, indicating a rise of 9.5 percent compared with the year before. Meanwhile, 148.6 thousand tons of various agricultural products were purchased by cooperatives at guaranteed prices, marking a 32-fold rise compared with March 2021.

3.9. Exports of Agricultural Products

Based on data released by the Ministry of Agriculture-Jahad, 8.5 million tons of various agricultural products worth \$5.3 billion were exported in 2021/22, indicating falls of 3.4 and 14.1 percent in terms of weight and value, respectively. Exports of agricultural products accounted for 7.0 percent of the weight and 11.0 percent of the total value of exports through Customs¹. In 2021/22, "farming products" accounted for 61.5 percent of total agricultural exports in terms of weight. "Horticultural products", despite a lower share of 29.3 percent in the weight of agricultural exports, accounted for 47.5 percent of the total value of agricultural exports.

3.10. Imports of Agricultural Products

According to the Ministry of Agriculture-Jahad, approximately 30.5 million tons of various agricultural products valued at \$17.1 billion were imported in 2021/22, showing increases of 28.9 and 56.9 percent in terms of weight and value, respectively. Imports of agricultural products accounted for 32.3 percent of the value and 74.2 percent of the weight of imported products. Meanwhile, the average value of each ton of imported agricultural products was \$560, indicating a rise of 21.7 percent compared with the year before. Imports of wheat amounted to 7.1 million tons in 2021/22, indicating an increase of 115.4 percent compared with the year before.

In 2021/22, the value of imported wheat increased by 170.5 percent compared with 2020/21 to \$2.5 billion. Furthermore, the trade deficit of the agriculture sector increased by 150.6 percent to \$11.8 billion in the year under review. The increase in the trade deficit of the agriculture sector was the result of a rise of 56.9 percent in the value of the imports of agricultural goods versus a

fall of 14.1 percent in the value of the exports of agricultural commodities. Meanwhile, the average per-ton value of exported agricultural products decreased by 11.1 percent to \$625 in 2021/22. Considering the composition of agricultural imports and exports, the terms of trade of the agriculture sector decreased by 26.9 percent from 1.53 in 2020/21 to 1.12 in 2021/22.
